Identification

Identification documentation is necessary for most aspects of life – to secure employment and housing, apply for benefits, access treatment, and much more. This is often the first step in the transition from incarceration to the community. Learn about the importance of each document and ways to obtain them for your state.

Birth Certificate

In order to receive a birth certificate, you will need to contact the Office of Vital Records in the state in which you were born. Find a local office to learn about the process.

Driver's License or State ID

Housing

Appropriate housing may be difficult to find due to requirements and background information needed. Federal Housing

The Department of Housing and Development (HUD) connects homeless individuals with public housing, also known as “Section 8”. Find out if you are eligible for government support.
